Sheltered Population increased to 359 people in 2021, as compared to 270 people in 2020. INCREASED SHELTER CAPACITY: 183 seasonal shelter beds added in response to the COVID pandemic that included local public and private funds leveraging the following Federal CARES Act funding sources:

- \* Emergency Solution Grant-CV,
- \* Emergency Food & Shelter Program-Phase 37 CARES, and
- \* County CARES Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF)

CHANGE IN CAPACITY DUE TO COVID-19: Implemented a new 120-day "enrolled" shelter program to prevent COVID disease transmission by operating five shelter sites throughout the CoC that provided 24/7 shelter services to persons enrolled in the program. This prevented unhoused populations from moving around the CoC seeking shelter and resources on a daily basis.

CHANGE IN PARTICIPATION OF PROGRAMS DUE TO COVID-19: Due to COVID-19, shelter services provided by Interfaith Hospitality Network (Family Promise of Washington County) ended as Oregon Governor enacted Executive Order 20-12 to "Stay Home, Stay Safe" resulting in churches ending their overnight shelter services that were still closed in January 2021. Shelter and Transition Housing programs with common areas (e.g. restroom, kitchen and living room) reduced the number of occupants in the program to prevent COVID disease transmission.



Unsheltered Population increased to 357 people in 2021, as compared to 307 people in 2020. CHANGE IN PARTICIPATION OF PROGRAMS: In 2020 the CoC implement a national Community Solutions initiative – Built For Zero – that included expanding outreach programs to provide greater geographic coverage and develop relationships with the unhoused population. The PIT unsheltered count included outreach and peer support staffing that performed Wellness Checks, provided information on COVID symptoms, testing and vaccination availability, and collected demographic data of the unhoused population. The expanded outreach increased the effective use of enumerators to cover the geographic region of the CoC for the PIT noting an increase in unsheltered persons as unhoused persons report leaving the metropolitan area where riots are occurring to seek safe refuge in suburban and rural areas of Washington County's CoC jurisdiction.

INCREASED OR IMPROVED PIT COUNT TRAINING: The PIT training for 52 enumerators (e.g. social workers and outreach workers) included COVID safety protocols and the use of a new Simtech Solutions APP (Counting Us) to collect data and map locations of PIT interviews. The APP automated the collection of data for the annual homeless census using cell phone devices with training on use of the APP and privacy/security of all data collected. The data was imported into an HMIS comparable database and used to extrapolate the 2021 Point-In-Time data.
