

Measure No. 34-166

BALLOT TITLE

BOND ISSUE TO PRESERVE NATURAL AREAS, AND DEVELOP PARKS, TRAILS.

QUESTION: Shall City issue \$20 million general obligation bonds to preserve natural areas, develop parks and trails beginning fiscal year 2010-2011?

If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: If approved, this measure would authorize the City of Tigard to sell up to \$20 million in bonds for costs of capital construction and improvements, including land acquisition and restoration, which would:

- Preserve natural areas,
- Create and improve community parks, recreational areas and trails,
- Protect creeks and streams for improved local water quality, and
- Protect streams, fish and wildlife.

The Parks and Recreation Board would provide oversight; proceeds would be audited in City's yearly audit.

Bonds would mature in 21 years or less from issuance and may be issued in one or more series. The estimated additional annual cost to property owners if all \$20 million in bonds are sold would be \$0.32 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. For the owner of a home with the median assessed value of \$200,893, the city estimates that the additional monthly cost would be about \$5.41 per month, or \$65 per year.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

With passage of the Bond Measure, voters would direct the City of Tigard to preserve natural areas, create, improve and develop parks, preserve clean water by acquiring lands near rivers, creeks and steams and protect wildlife habitat throughout Tigard, while managing the impacts of growth.

The \$20 million general obligation bond measure would allow for the implementation of a significant portion of the Tigard Park System Master Plan, balancing the following objectives:

- The acquisition of land for the creation of high quality parks and natural areas for both active and passive recreation for all ages, with the goal of parks within a half-mile of every Tigard resident.
- The acquisition of natural areas intended primarily for protection of critical natural resources, including rare and state and federally listed species, so that natural areas are an integral part of every Tigard neighborhood.
- The improvement and development of existing neighborhood and community parks throughout Tigard.
- The acquisition of land and easements for the creation of an interconnected regional and local system of on- and off- road trails and paths that link together neighborhoods, parks, natural areas, major urban activity centers and regional recreational opportunities.
- The preservation of clean water throughout Tigard through the acquisition of sensitive lands near rivers, creeks, streams and wetlands.

In the first year following its passage, the 2009 Natural Areas, Parks and Trails Bond Measure would likely cost property owners 32 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. For the average homeowner, the total annual cost is likely to be \$5.41 per month or \$65 per year.

Additionally, all spending from this measure would be subject to oversight by the Tigard Parks and Recreation Board and

audits within the City's yearly audit to ensure that all funds are spent efficiently and appropriately in a balanced manner. And by law, no money from the measure can be used for administrators' salaries.

Measure No. 34-168

BALLOT TITLE

PROPOSAL TO ANNEX 34.2 ACRES TO CITY

QUESTION: Should 34.2 acres on the northern portion of the City of Sherwood be annexed to the City of Sherwood?

SUMMARY: Approval of this ballot measure will annex two parcels totaling 34.2 acres to the City of Sherwood. The parcels are on the northern boundary of the City of Sherwood. The areas to be annexed are surrounded on all side except a portion of the eastern edge by property inside the City limits. The parcels are north of Tualatin-Sherwood Road and east of Pacific Highway. The area to be annexed is currently developed with a PGE power substation and overhead transmission lines. A legal description and maps of the parcels are on file at the Sherwood City Hall.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Annexation No AN 09-01 Explanatory Statement

Under Sherwood City charter, annexations of property to the City can take place only with a majority of city voter's approval. Under state law, annexations must also include the approval of the voters who live in the area to be annexed. No people reside on these two properties.

If approved by voters, this measure will add 34.2 acres to the City of Sherwood. The area proposed to be annexed is also referred to as the Portland General Electric (PGE) Annexation.

The area was brought into the Urban Growth Boundary by Metro to allow for the extension of SW Adams Avenue northward providing connections between SW Tualatin Sherwood Road and Highway 99W. The Adams Avenue Concept Plan was prepared to improve connectivity through Sherwood and develop a plan to provide additional employment areas within the City. PGE requested the annexation.


The area is next to the City's current northern boundaries and is immediately north of SW Tualatin-Sherwood Road and west of SW Arrow St. The area to be annexed is generally southeast of 99W, separated by a parcel of land currently inside the city limits and also owned by PGE.

The northern, western, southern and part of the eastern boundaries of the area proposed to be annexed are contiguous to the City. This area will form part of the City's eastern boundary if this measure is approved.

The proposed annexation area has a PGE substation, PGE power lines, Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) power lines and undeveloped land. No people reside on this property and the entire 34.2 area is owned by Portland General Electric.

If annexed, the area will be re-zoned to conform to City zoning. All 34.2 acres of the annexed area would be zoned light industrial for employment purposes. The substation will remain. Approximately, six acres will be able to be developed for light industrial purposed due to limits on development under PGE and BPA power lines. The remaining area will be used for the SW Adams Avenue extension right of way.

BALLOT TITLE

CHARTER AMENDMENT CHANGING MAYOR'S TERM TO A TWO-YEAR TERM.

QUESTION: Shall Banks City Charter be amended to change Mayor's term from a four-year term to two-year term?

SUMMARY: Section 25 of the Banks City Charter was changed in 2007 to make the Mayor's term a four-year term. In 2008 after this change was implemented, no Banks residents ran for the office of Mayor. The City Council wishes to amend Section 25 of the City Charter to make the Mayor's term of office once again a two year term to perhaps encourage more interest by citizens in running for this important official responsibility. If passed this charter amendment would apply to the next Mayoral election in the year 2012.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure amends Section 25 to have the Mayor's term of office be a two-year term. Prior to the 2008 term, the term of office for Mayor was a two-year term. In 2008 no one ran as an official candidate of Mayor for the City of Banks. There is concern that the lengthening of the term of office to four years was one of the reasons for a lack of candidates. If approved, the new term office for a Mayor would be 2 years with the election in the Fall of 2012. The Candidate would take office in January 2013 for a two-year term.

BALLOT TITLE

AMEND CITY CHARTER SECTION 24 TO HAVE NUMBERED COUNCIL POSITIONS

QUESTION: Shall Section 24 of Charter be amended to have Council positions numbered allowing candidates to seek a specific council position?

SUMMARY: The current Banks City Charter has City council candidates run for office with the top vote getters of the number of candidates running filling the number of open positions on the council. This method of electing councilors may discourage candidates from running for office for fear that they would unseat an incumbent councilor that they did not wish to be running against. By numbering council positions, candidates could select which council position, an incumbent or perhaps a vacant position as the case may be, that they wished to be a candidate for.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This Measure amends the Banks City Charter regarding electing City Councilors by having numbered Council Positions. If adopted the current councilor's position would all be assigned a numbered council position according to when their term would be up. Currently, a city council candidate runs against all other council candidates with the top vote getters being elected to the positions up for election at that time. Under this new situation, a candidate would not run against all council members but would select which council position or incumbent that she or he wishes to oppose. As in the current city election, no run off would occur. If approved, the new election process will be in effect beginning in 2010. Candidates elected at the November 2010 General Election would seek on individually specific numbered council position.

BALLOT TITLE

CHARTER AMENDMENT REGARDING APPOINTMENT AND SUPERVISION OF CITY RECORDER OFFICE.

QUESTION: Shall the Charter be amended so that the City Manager is responsible for hiring and supervising the City Recorder's office?

SUMMARY: In 2007, the Banks City Charter was amended to add the office of City Manager. This charter amendment merely wishes to conform the Charter to current Banks City Charter Section 34 that provides that the City Manager is responsible for the appointing, supervising, and removal of the city's employees. This amendment if passed would clarify that the City Manager's responsibilities included the appointing, supervising, and removal of the City Recorder and the Pro-tem City Recorder. Section 36 of the current City Charter would be amended to have the City Manager appoint a recorder pro-tem.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This Measure updates the City Charter to comply with the internal practices of the City Government since the City's change in 2007 to a City Manager form of administration. In 2007 the City Charter was amended to change the form of government from a Mayor managed form of government to a City Manager form of government. Under the 2007 Charter amendments the City Manager is responsible for the hiring, supervision and removal of all City employees excluding the Municipal Judge and the City Attorney, who are independent officers of the City. The proposed Charter amendment will modify the Charter to comply with the 2007 Charter amendments to have the City Manager appoint, supervise and remove the City Recorder and the pro-tem recorder. Currently, the City Council and Mayor have the City Manager overseeing the City Recorder as this Amendment of the City Charter proposes.

QUESTION: Shall Banks City Charter be amended by correcting capitalization of proper pronouns and other correction of style and grammar?

These changes include usage changes such as the capitalization of Mayor, Municipal, and City Council where necessary, and also add the words City before the words Recorder, Manager and Council where necessary. These additions will not change the meaning of the content of the City of Banks Charter.

BALLOT TITLE

RENEWS FIVE-YEAR LOCAL OPTION LEVY FOR OPERATIONAL EXPENSES.

QUESTION: Shall district continue to levy \$.62 per \$1,000 of assessed value for five years beginning fiscal year 2010-2011?

This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

This measure renews current local option taxes.

SUMMARY: Banks Fire District No. 13 currently imposes a local option levy in the amount of \$.62 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The current levy is due to expire June 2010. This measure will continue the current levy rate for an additional five years. The District's current permanent tax rate does not allow the District to meet operational expenses. The funds raised by the continuation of the current local option levy will allow the District to continue meeting its operational costs, which include but are not limited to building and apparatus maintenance, training and public education, firefighter interns, protective clothing, utilities, rescue and medical supplies, and safety equipment. The proposed rate will raise approximately \$243,107 in 2010-2011, \$250,400 in 2011-2012, \$257,911 in 2012-2013, \$265,649 in 2013-2014, and \$273,618 in 2014-2015.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Banks Fire District #13 provides emergency rescue, medical care, and fire protection service to 136 square miles of western Washington County. This service area includes the communities of Banks, Buxton and Timber.

In 1998 the Oregon Department of Revenue established the Districts permanent tax rate of \$1.0831 per \$1000 of assessed value as a result of ballot measure 50. This rate was insufficient to meet rising costs associated with providing emergency service so in November 2004 voters approved a five year Local Option Tax of \$0.62 per \$1000 assessed value. This allowed the Banks Fire District to keep up with rising operational expenses. The LOT has insured the District patrons of reliable emergency response with a highly trained volunteer firefighter staff. Unfortunately, our LOT expires in June of 2010.

Banks Fire District is asking voters to renew the current levy for five more years at the same rate of \$0.62 per \$1000 of assessed value. It is important to note the district relies on this money for 40% of its annual operating revenue.

By renewing the current Local Option Tax the Banks Fire District will be able to continue providing emergency response, fire life safety programs, firefighter intern programs, building and apparatus maintenance, school fire prevention programs, maintain regular office hours, continue community CPR classes and expand volunteer firefighter recruitment and retention.

If approved the renewal of this LOT will generate the revenue necessary to continue meeting rising operation costs and maintain current response capabilities through 2015.

BALLOT TITLE

BOND TO BUILD SCHOOL FACILITIES DUE TO DECEMBER 2007 FLOOD

QUESTION: Is Vernonia District 47J authorized to pay local share of new facilities by issuing general obligation bonds not exceeding \$13,000,000? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and Ilb, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: If approved, this measure would provide funds for capital construction and improvements and bond issuance costs. Specifically, this measure is expected to provide the local portion of funding required to:

- Construct, furnish and equip elementary, middle and high school facilities on an insurable site above the flood plain.
- Purchase property and pay any related demolition and site improvement costs.
- Pay fees associated with issuing the bonds.

The Bonds would mature in twenty-six (26) years or less from the date of issuance and may be issued in one or more series.

FIVE YEAR LOCAL OPTION LEVY FOR POLICE SERVICES

QUESTION: Shall King City levy five-year local option tax of \$.5500 per \$1,000 of assessed value for police services beginning FY 2010-2011? This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent. This measure renews current local option taxes.

SUMMARY: This measure would authorize the City of King City to renew its local option levy for police services, at the rate of \$.5500 per \$1,000 of assessed value on real property located within the City, beginning FY2010-2011. The City's current five-year levy for police services at a rate of \$.4149, expires June 30, 2010.

If approved the revenues from the levy would be used to maintain police service at their current level, increase supervision, retain experienced officers, maintain competitive salaries and benefits to aid in hiring new officers, provide officer training, replace aging equipment, and continue participation in the Washington County-wide PPDS Records Systems.

The estimated total amount to be levied each year is as follows:

The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of estimate.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

On September 2, 2009, the City Council for the City of King City enacted Resolution R-09-1O calling for an election - Local Option Levy for police services, to continue police services at the current level. The City's current five-year levy for police services at a rate of \$.4149, expires June 30, 2010.

This will be a replacement of the current five-year levy which expires June 30, 2010. Approval of this levy will allow the city to maintain police services at their current level, increase supervision, retain experienced officers, maintain competitive salaries and benefits to aid in hiring new officers, provide officer training, replace aging equipment, and continue participation in the Washington County-wide PPDS Records Systems.

At the rate of \$.5500 per thousand assessed valuation, the cost for a home assessed at \$150,000 would be \$82.50 annually.
