Question: Shall Hillsboro renew the operating levy of \$1.72 per \$1,000 for police, fire and parks for five years beginning 2013-14? This measure renews current local option taxes.

Summary: This measure would renew the current police, fire and parks operating levy approved by voters in 2006, which expires in June 2013. Renewing the levy would pay for continuing current services for police, fire and emergency medical response, and parks maintenance. The majority of the levy would go to the Hillsboro Police and Fire Departments and the remainder to parks maintenance services. The City Council placed this measure on the ballot to maintain existing services and programs for police, fire and park maintenance such as:

Police would maintain:

- Detectives for investigations, including internet crime, fraud and elder abuse
- Community policing programs
- Street crimes, narcotics and gang enforcement programs
- Child and domestic violence intervention

- Hazardous materials and technical rescue emergency response capabilities
- · Fire prevention, public education and safety programs
- Disaster preparedness programs

Parks would maintain:

• Upkeep of recreation facilities, parks, playgrounds, ball fields, wetlands, natural areas and future developed parkland Estimated revenues for each year of levy:

\$15,776,379 in 2013-14 \$16,249,671 in 2014-15 \$16,737,161 in 2015-16 \$17,239,276 in 2016-17 \$17,756,454 in 2017-18

Explanatory Statement

The City of Hillsboro provides public safety services including police, fire and emergency medical services to its citizens. The City also provides parks maintenance services to City park facilities, wetlands and natural areas. This measure would provide funding to maintain police, fire and emergency medical services and parks maintenance services.

The voters authorized a tax levy of \$1.72 per \$1,000 of assessed value in 2006, which expires in 2013. The levy was first authorized by voters in 1998. This levy would maintain the current rate of \$1.72 per \$1,000 of assessed value for five years starting in July 2013. If passed, the majority of the levy would go to police, fire and emergency medical services. The remaining amount of the levy would be used for parks maintenance services.

What would renewal of the levy voters approved in 2006 do?

Measure 34-195 would enable police, fire and parks to continue providing programs and services such as:

Police would maintain:

- Sworn officers on duty
- · Community policing, crime prevention and community involvement programs
- School resource officers
- Child abuse/youth intervention
- Light rail patrols and traffic enforcement
- Code enforcement
- Criminal investigations
- Youth outreach and education

Fire would maintain:

- Response times to emergency medical and fire calls at internationally accredited performance benchmarks Safety programs designed to reach children, elderly and
- other at-risk populations
- Community disaster preparedness and prevention programs

- Fire apparatus staffing

Parks would maintain:

- Park maintenance and landscaping
- Wetland and natural area maintenance

How would this renewal affect property taxes if this measure passes?

The levy would continue the current rate of \$1.72 per \$1,000 of assessed value, unchanged from the current rate. The cost per household for a home with a taxable assessed value of \$200,000 (different than market value), would be, on average, about \$387 each year for the five years of the levy.

What if the measure fails?

The current local option tax of \$1.72 approved by the voters would end June 30, 2013. Public safety and parks maintenance would continue to remain a priority; however, the City would likely have to decrease service levels in police, fire and parks maintenance.







Ballot Title

Five-Year Levy for Public Safety and Community Services

Question: Shall Forest Grove levy taxes of \$1.60 per \$1,000 of assessed value for five years beginning 2013-14 for general operations?

This measure may cause property taxes to increase by more than three percent (3%).

Summary: In November 2007, voters approved a levy for \$1.35 per \$1,000 of assessed value to restore and then maintain City services, principally police and fire. That levy expires in June 2013.

To try to maintain the current level of services, the City is proposing increasing the levy to \$1.60 per \$1,000 of assessed value. No additional services would be added.

This levy would maintain services such as the Fire Department's ability to respond to two fire or medical calls at the same time.

A typical homeowner with an average assessed value (not market value) of \$180,000 pays \$243 per year in property taxes for the current \$1.35 levy. The increase in the levy rate to \$1.60 would cost a typical homeowner an additional \$45 per year in property taxes.

Estimated revenues for the levy:

\$2,045,995 in 2013-2014

\$2,107,375 in 2014-2015

\$2,170,596 in 2015-2016

\$2,235,714 in 2016-2017

\$2,302,785 in 2017-2018

Explanatory Statement

What is the Public Safety/Community Services Levy?

A five-year operating local option levy for \$1.60 per \$1,000 assessed value to try to maintain City services in the General Fund over the next five years. Police and Fire are the principal General Fund programs. The current cost of police and fire services is about equal to the City's total property tax revenue. Other City services that are partially funded by the levy are the library, aquatic center, parks & recreation, planning and administration.

What is the City's recent property tax levy history?

The local option levy allows Forest Grove to continue to be a full-service City. Voters first passed a five-year local option levy in 2002. In November 2007, voters approved a five-year local option levy for \$1.35 per \$1,000 of assessed value to maintain City services with a priority on maintaining public safety services. That levy expires in June 2013.

What services have changed since the November 2007 levy?

The recession of 2008 caused the City to make reductions in the services listed above. The City has been able to maintain that slightly reduced level of services since then. Demand for City services has continued to increase in many areas including library and parks. The City has developed a very active volunteer program that has helped us help keep up with the growing demand in our Police, Fire, Library, Parks, and Planning Departments.

Why the increase from \$1.35 to \$1.60?

Because the levy is fixed for five years, the \$1.35 levy will not allow the City to keep up with rising costs and maintain the current level of services for the next five years without cutting key services. The City is proposing \$1.60 per \$1,000 of assessed value to maintain services at their present level although the City would need to continue to find ways to reduce costs.

What impact would this measure have on a homeowner's property tax?

A typical homeowner pays \$243 per year in property taxes for the \$1.35 levy. This measure proposes to increase the current levy by \$0.25 to \$1.60 per \$1,000 of assessed value effective July 1, 2013. A typical homeowner with an assumed average assessed value (not market value) of \$180,000 would pay an additional \$45.00 per year or \$3.75 per month in property taxes.

What happens if the levy fails?

The City would have a difficult time remaining a full-service City. Although public safety would remain a priority, the City would need to make \$1.6 million in reductions in police, fire, library, aquatics, parks, planning & administration services. Police and Fire services would likely be reduced to less than the service level provided prior to the 2002 levy. The Fire Department would find it difficult to maintain staffing levels necessary to respond to two calls at the same time. In 2011, Forest Grove Fire responded 393 times to two or more calls at the same time. The City would need to make major reduction in Parks and Library services as well.

Question: Shall tort claim notice provision in Portland City Charter be amended to be consistent with state law?

Summary: Currently, Portland City Charter Section 1-106 states that tort claim notices must be presented to the City Attorney. Amends City Charter provisions regarding Mayor's fund

Question: Shall Charter language allowing use of Mayor's limited fund without documentation be deleted and name of fund be changed?

Summary: Portland City Charter Section 2-105(a)(14) currently provides that the Council may appropriate up to \$2,000 per year to the Mayor for a secret service fund and that no supporting documentation of expenditures from that fund must be provided. This measure would delete the Charter language allowing the fund to be used without providing supporting evidence of expenditures. As a result, expenditures from this fund would be accounted for in the same manner as other City expenditures. The measure would also change the name of the fund from "secret service Fund" to "discretionary Fund."

Explanatory Statement

This measure amends the Portland City Charter. Currently, the Portland City Charter Section 2-105(a)(14) allows the Council to appropriate up to \$2,000 per year to the Mayor for use as a secret service fund for which no vouchers need to be provided, meaning that no supporting evidence of expenditures from the fund is required. As a result, expenditures from this fund would be accounted for as other City expenditures are by submitting supporting documentation. The measure would also change the name of the fund from "secret service Fund" to "discretionary Fund" to clarify the purpose of the fund.

Deletion of this section of the City's specific powers will not impair the City's general powers and authority to protect and support public health and safety.

The Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters. The City's Charter Commission reviewed the Charter and identified parts of the Charter that the Commission determined are outdated, unenforceable or offensive, including Charter Section 2-105(a)(51). The Charter Commission proposes deletion of Section 2-105(a)(51) of the Charter because the section contains outdated, offensive and unenforceable terms. This section can be deleted without changing City government structure or operations.

Explanatory Statement

This measure deletes Portland City Charter Section 2-105(a)(54) which currently states that the City may "prohibit the exhibition of deformed or crippled persons" and prohibit all persons from begging on streets or in public places. The terms "deformed or crippled" are outdated and offensive. Further, the City does not have legal authority to prohibit all begging. Deletion of this section of the City's specific powers will not impair the City's general powers and authority to protect and support public health and safety, including constitutionally allowed restrictions on activities in the right of way and in public places.

The Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters. The City's Charter Commission reviewed the Charter and identified parts of the Charter that the Commission determined are outdated, unenforceable or offensive, including Charter Section 2-105(a)(54). The Charter Commission recommends deletion of Section 2-105(a)(54) because the section includes outdated, offensive and unenforceable terms. This section can be deleted or amended without changing City government structure or operations.

The Charter further provides that the Council is not required to provide documentation of use of the funds. This measure would delete the Charter language allowing the fund to be used without providing supporting evidence of expenditures. As a result, spending from this fund would be accounted for in the same manner as other City spending.

Explanatory Statement

This measure amends the Portland City Charter. Currently, Portland City Charter Section 2-108 provides that the Council may appropriate up to \$5,000 per year to the Council to use without providing vouchers, meaning that no supporting evidence of the expenditures is required. This measure would delete the Charter language allowing the fund to be used without vouchers. As a result, spending from this fund would be accounted for by submission of supporting documentation in the same manner as other City expenditures.

The City Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters. This amendment will not change City government structure.

Amends Charter to clarify election procedure for filling vacancies

Question: Shall Portland City Charter procedures to fill vacancies in elective office be clarified?

Summary: Section 2-206 of the Charter specifies the elections process and timing for filling vacancies in elective City offices. Section 2-206 provides an election procedure to fill vacancies that may occur at any time during a City elected official's four year term. Each of the three subsections of Section 2-206 - (b), (c) and (d) - applies to different periods of time during the four year term. While the wording of Subsection (b) is ambiguous, the City has interpreted Subsection (b) to apply to the periods of time not covered by Subsections (c) and (d). However, because of one ambiguous word, Subsection (b) could possibly be interpreted in a way that renders Subsection (b) meaningless. Changing the single word "but" to "or" in Subsection (b) would clarify that section's meaning consistent with intent and would ensure that vacancies occurring during the first three years of an elected official's term are appropriately addressed by the Charter election procedures.

Explanatory Statement

This measure amends the Portland City Charter. Section 2-206 of the Charter specifies the elections process and timing for filling vacancies in elective City offices. The intent of Section 2-206 is to ensure that there is an election procedure to fill vacancies that may occur at any time during a City elected official's four year term. Each of the three subsections of Section 2-206 - (b), (c) and (d) - is intended to apply to different periods of time during the four year term. While the wording of Subsection (b) is ambiguous, the City has interpreted Subsection (b) to apply to the periods of time not covered by Subsections (c) and (d). However, Subsection (b) could be interpreted to apply only if a vacancy occurs both more than 100 days before the primary election in the fourth year of the term but also less than seventy-one days before the general election in the fourth year, even though these two time periods could not overlap, rendering Subsection (b) meaningless. Changing the single word "but" to "or" in Subsection (b) would clarify that section's meaning consistent with intent and would ensure that vacancies occurring during the first three years of an elected official's term are covered by the Charter.

The Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters. The City's Charter Commission reviewed the Charter and identified parts of the Charter that the Commission determined are outdated, unenforceable or offensive, including Section 2-206(b). This section can be amended without changing City government structure or operations.

Ballot Title

Amends Charter: Adds terms and vacancy provision for Charter Commission

Question: Shall terms of office and vacancy provisions for the Charter Commission be added to the Portland City Charter?

Summary: Currently, Charter Section 13-301 directs the City Council to appoint a Charter Commission at least every ten years. The Charter does not specify the length of Charter Commission members' terms, nor does the Charter identify how vacancies on the Charter Commission will be filled.

This measure provides that the term of office for Charter Commission members shall be no less than two years; the Council will also have the power to reappoint members to additional terms or future Charter Commissions. The measure defines when a vacancy exists on the Charter Commission and how vacancies will be filled.

Explanatory Statement

This measure amends the Portland City Charter. In 2007, City voters approved Charter amendments requiring the City to periodically review its Charter. The new Charter provisions direct the City Council to appoint a Charter Commission at least every 10 years. However, the Charter does not specify the length of Charter Commission members' terms or identify how vacancies on the Charter Commission are to be filled.

The Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters. The Charter Commission recommends amending Charter Section 13-301 to specify that the Council shall appoint Charter Commission members to a term of office of at least two years and may appoint members to additional terms or later Charter commissions. The Housekeeping Committee further recommends amending Charter Section 13-301 to define when a vacancy exists on the Charter Commission and how a vacancy will be filled.

Any remaining rights or obligations of the former City Exposition-Recreation Commission are otherwise vested in the City Council pursuant to the Charter and these agreements. This measure would delete Charter Chapter 14 without affecting City government structure or operations.

The Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters.
