## **Washington County Community Engagement Priorities**

### **Boards and Commissions**

Expand recruitment and increase participation on Washington County Boards and Commissions to include a broad representation of people who live and work in Washington County.

### **County Departmental Support**

Provide technical assistance and guidance to County Departments as they work to identify and pursue community engagement opportunities.

### **Committee for Community Involvement (CCI) & Community Participation Organizations (CPOs)**

Continue to provide technical assistance for agendas, meeting announcements, and participant rosters; and consultation for facilitation, expanding participation, and supporting CPOs to maintain active status and bylaws compliance.

Expand Participation to include a broader representation from each CPO area by identifying and addressing barriers to participation and provide guidance on creating a welcoming environment.

Continue to support CCI to help CPOs with their active status and provide technical assistance and consultation for CPOs that need assistance with being-in or maintaining compliance with bylaws.

### **Pathways for Participation**

Create pathways for increased participation of under-represented groups by working with community-based organizations on equitable engagement opportunities.

**Regarding:** Proposal for CPO Boundary Changes

The May, 2012 Boundary Change Taskforce Final Report notes that CPO boundary changes include a narrative justification for moving boundaries. It also outlines the need for consideration by each of the potentially impacted CPOs.

CPOs 4K (King City), 4B (Bull Mountain) and 10 (Chehalem) request CCI's consideration and approval to submit changes to their shared boundaries to the Washington County Board of Commissioners for their consideration and approval.

The attached map indicates existing and proposed boundary changes. The underlying rationale for requested changes is based on the adopted Urban Reserves (Oregon HB 4078 and implementing Oregon Administrative Rules - OARs) providing long term jurisdictional planning to lands surrounding the cities of King City, Tigard, and Beaverton. The affected jurisdictions specifically are King City and its urban reserve between SW 131<sup>st</sup> and Roy Rogers Road and between SW Beef Bend Road and the Tualatin River for CPO 4K. The other jurisdiction is the City of Tigard with urban reserves west of Bull Mountain and south of Roy Rogers Road.

Adjusting the boundaries of these three CPOs brings the appropriate areas into the CPOs with common city limits and adjacent lands identified for future development.

All three CPOs have considered the boundary changes at their respective meetings and agree with the proposed changes.

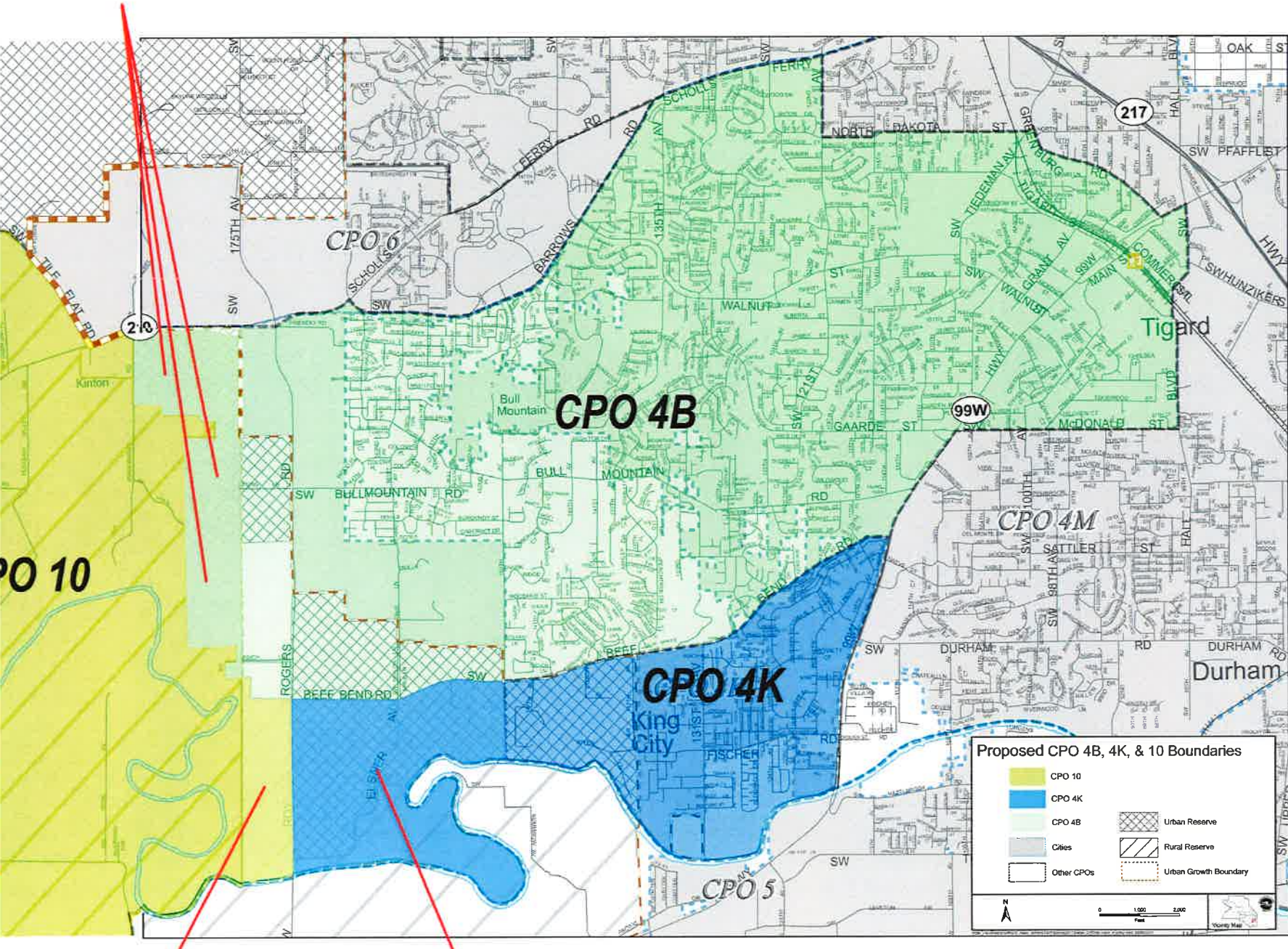

## **CPO4K/4B/10 Boundary Change Proposal (Including Adjustment of CPO4M Boundaries)**

Update March 20, 2018

This proposed boundary change reflects the land use planning areas for King City, Tigard and the unincorporated areas of Washington County that surround those planning areas. Under Oregon House Bill 4078, urban reserves were determined for a 40 – 50 year timeframe providing certainty where cities could expand.

The boundary exchanges between CPO4K and CPO4B were requested several years ago but the process was never completed. Both CPOs have presented the proposal to their CPOs with agreement to move forward.

On March 15, the proposed boundary changes were presented to CPO10 as some areas currently within that CPO are in the King City and City of Tigard urban reserves. Conversely, small areas within CPO4B are designated rural reserves under HB 4078 and could be better served by the mostly rural CPO10. Following the presentation, CPO10 attendees agreed unanimously to support the changes.

CPO4M proposed changes remove the City of Durham and small pieces of the City of Tualatin from the CPO's district. Both cities have their own public engagement programs and have not been historically served by the CPO. The proposed change clarifies the community the CPO could/should serve. This proposal was presented to CPO4M at their December, 2017 meeting. The CPO Chair asked to bring the proposal back for a vote. It was scheduled for the February 2018 meeting, but the Chair has not provided evidence that a presentation and discussion ensued.

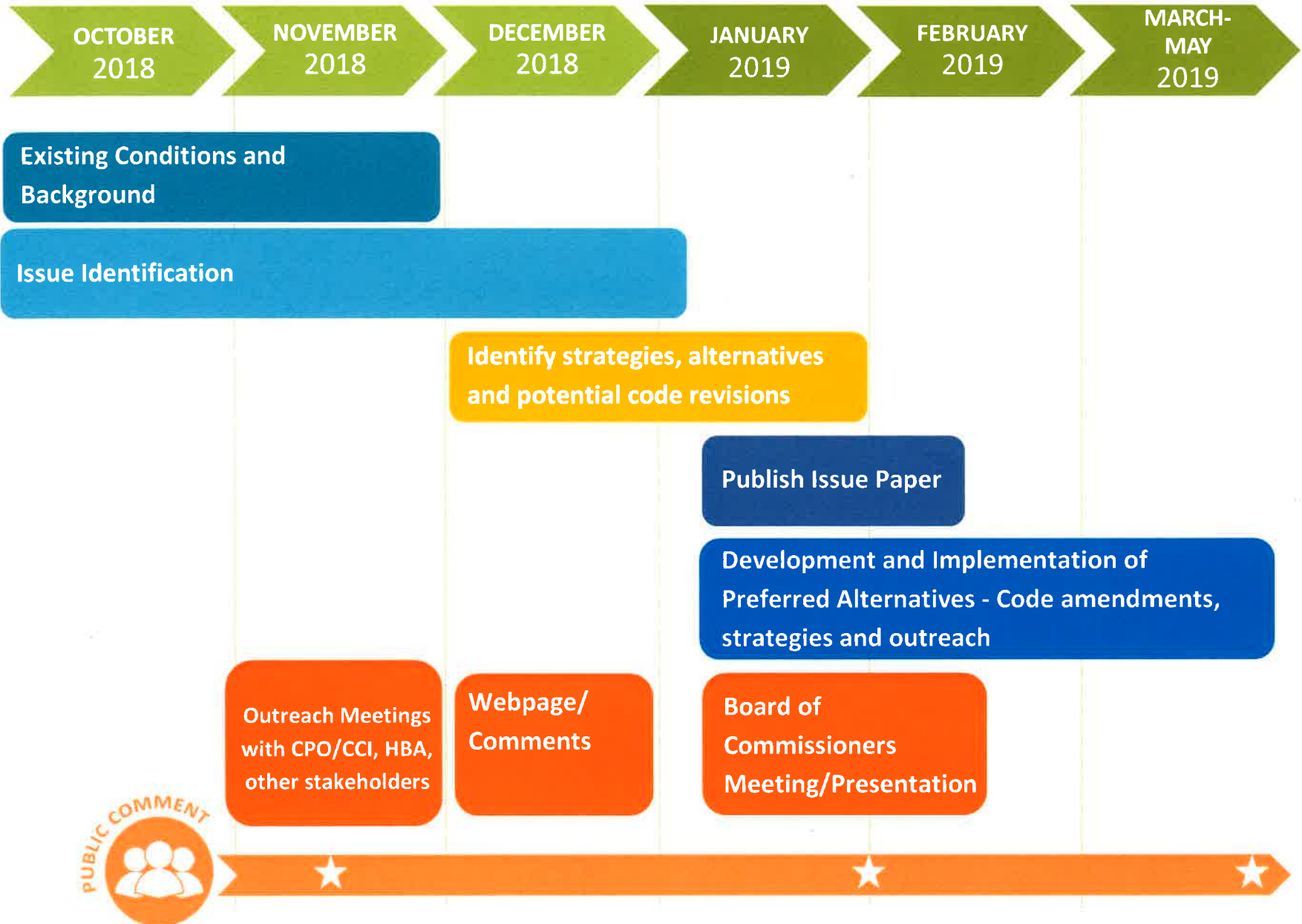
