

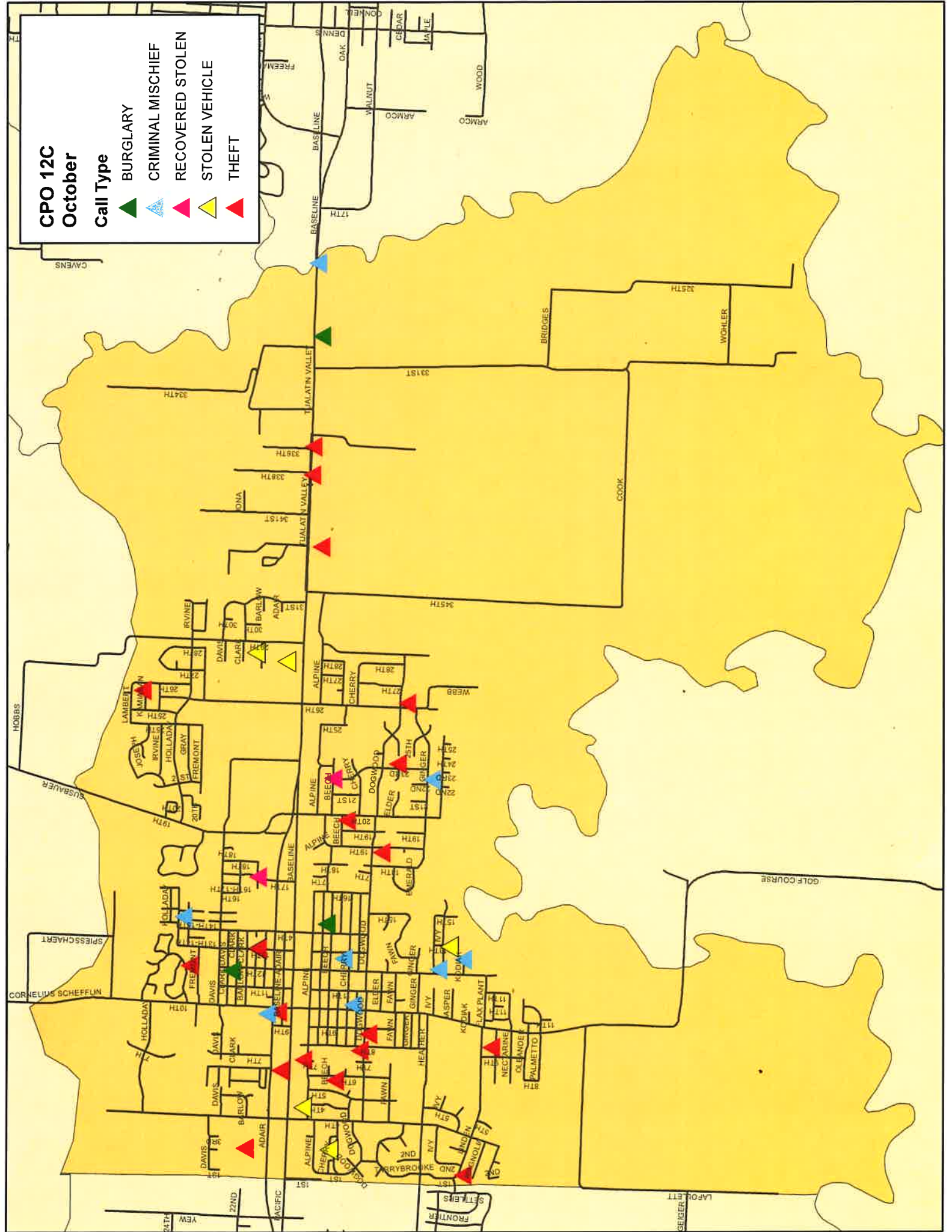

**LET'S END
DOMESTIC VIOLENCE**

In observance of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, the Beaverton and Hillsboro Police Departments, WCSO, District Attorney's Office and victim advocates are standing together to break the silence of domestic violence.

YOU ARE NOT ALONE - GET SUPPORT LOCALLY

If you, or someone you know, are in a domestic violence situation, there are local resources available. The Family Justice Center in Beaverton is a collaboration of agencies, including the Domestic Violence Resource Center, Oregon Law Center and Department of Human Services, dedicated to providing support and hope to those impacted by family and intimate partner violence through comprehensive and compassionate services. LAW ENFORCEMENT IS HERE, READY TO LISTEN AND HELP

Many local law enforcement agencies staff dedicated domestic violence teams and victim advocates. On October 17, the Beaverton Police Department, Hillsboro Police Department, Washington County Parole & Probation and WCSO participated in the 16th annual National Family Violence Apprehension Detail. During the mission, participating agencies coordinated closely to attempt to locate and apprehend suspects of family violence warrants and criminal investigations within Washington County. By the end of the day, law enforcement conducted 47 checks to locate family violence suspects, resulting in four arrests.

INVESTIGATION OF ROCK CREEK SHOOTING UNDERWAY

September 30 – At 12:47am, deputies responded to reports of gunfire at a residence in the Rock Creek community. Initial reports were that someone had been shot during an altercation at a large party.

Deputies arrived and rendered medical aid to an 18-year-old male suffering from life-threatening injuries. The victim was transported to a local trauma hospital where he was later pronounced deceased.

Investigators learned the suspect fled the scene in the moments after the shooting. Multiple deputies searched the area but were unable to locate the suspect.

Detectives with the inter-agency Washington County Major Crimes Team are leading the investigation. No suspect information is available for release at this time.

Detectives would like to speak with anyone who attended the party or has information regarding the incident. Individuals with information are asked to call WCSO at 503-846-2700.

Beaverton Police, Hillsboro Police, Oregon State Police, Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue, and Metro West Ambulance assisted during the incident.

TEACHER ARRESTED FOR CHILD PORNOGRAPHY

October 10 - Detectives began investigating a child pornography case in April and executed a search warrant at the home of 40-year-old Geoffrey Germano in May, finding sexually explicit images and videos of children in his possession. He was later arrested in October. He was employed as a teacher with the Beaverton School District at Aloha High School but is not currently employed there. The charges are unrelated to his employment.

BICYCLIST DIES AFTER CRASH OUTSIDE HILLSBORO

October 1 - 28-year-old Jim McGauvran of Cornelius was pronounced deceased after he was struck by the driver of a Jeep Grand Cherokee while riding a bike on Tualatin Valley Highway. The driver and passenger in the Jeep, both 55-years-old, were uninjured, remained at the scene and are cooperating with the investigation. Investigators do not believe any crimes or traffic violations were committed by the driver.

BETHANY HIT BY RASH OF THEFTS FROM MAILBOXES

Between October 21 and October 25, deputies have responded to at least ten different incidents in which mailboxes were tampered with or broken into and mail was stolen from inside. The majority of the incidents have involved community mailboxes and occurred in the Bethany community. At least one additional incident has been reported in the Aloha community. The United States Postal Inspection Service has been notified of the incidents.

FIGHTING FRAUD  PROTECTING OREGONIANS

SIX SIGNS IT IS A SCAM

1. Scammers Contact You “Out Of The Blue”

It could be a knock on the door, a phone call, or a piece of mail you weren't expecting. For example, you didn't think you owed the IRS or a debt collection agency money, but they called claiming you could be in trouble if you don't pay.

2. Scammers Claim There Is An “Emergency”

A scam might warn that if you don't respond immediately your prize winnings will be lost, or that a relative or friend is in trouble in a foreign country. If something prompts immediate action, be cautious.

3. Scammers Ask For Your Personal Information

Scammers often pose as banks, health care providers and government officials asking for identifying personal or financial information. Anytime someone asks you for this information, be suspicious!

4. Scammers Want You To Wire Money

You may be asked to wire money or purchase pre-paid debit cards. This is the easiest way for scam artists to get their hands on your money, and it's almost impossible to get it back once it has been sent. Don't do it!

5. Scammers Tell You To Keep It “Secret”

By asking you to keep a transaction secret, scammers know you won't have to respond to questions from family and friends who might see through the scam. Check with someone you trust before acting.

6. Scammers Make It Sound Too Good To Be True

If it seems too good to be true, it probably is! Above all, use this simple mantra to help you detect and avoid scams. It's always better to be cautious than to be a victim.
