Applications for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funding in fiscal year 2024-25 were thoroughly reviewed and rated by staff and your Board. This evaluation process was completed on January 29, 2024. Based on that process the ranking of projects for **CDBG** funding is outlined in the chart below.

These lists include projects rated by your Board as well as projects that receive set-aside funding, joint entitlement funding, funding for the Housing Rehabilitation Program our office operates directly, and our office's administrative funding.

4. CONSOLIDATED PLAN PRESENTATION

Office of Community Development alongside Cities of Hillsboro and Beaverton staff have been working on the 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan. The Consolidated Plan is a five-year strategic plan that builds on an intensive community engagement process to assess housing and community development needs and prioritize investment of an estimated \$35 million of federal investment over the next 5 years. The Consolidated Planning process is required for all jurisdictions that receive HUD Formula Block Grant Programs which include Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), and HOME Investment Partnerships Program. The main elements of the Consolidated Plan are a Needs Assessment, Housing Market Analysis, Strategic Plan, and Action Plan.

5. RATING PROCESS AND SCORING CRITERIEA DEBRIEF DISCUSSION:

There was a discussion regarding the equity question, it was unclear on how to rate with the point system having different calculation options. The equity question is the only one where the score given is doubled within the Zoomgrants software. The suggestion was made to keep the amount of points for the question the same, but remove the doubling done by the software. That keeps the weight of the question the same at 8 points, but gives more transparency in the process by PAB members awarding on the full scale of 0-8 points.

The ratings due date came up and there were a few ideas on the best day to have them due. Some members like having the weekend to work on them, while there are some who would like to have them due on a Monday or Tuesday to ensure having a staff person available for assistance. There was some mention of moving the presentations up earlier in the cycle as well. ZoomGrants was also a topic of discussion, and it was brought up that having the fiscal year dates at the beginning of the title listings would be helpful.

Feedback was also brought up, PAB asked what feedback the applicants get. Different ways to give and provide feedback were discusses as well as the overall availability for applicants to receive feedback.

Staff will work on making some adjustments and creating opportunities to accommodate the PAB needs and requests.

6. <u>NATIONAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT WEEK AND FAIR HOUSING</u> <u>MONTH:</u>

Shannon announced National Community Development Week and Fair Housing Month.

We will be sending letters out the cities and meeting with the Washington County Commissioners on April 2nd, 2024.

We are asking that each jurisdiction consider doing proclamations, and to share with us as we forward these to our congressional delegation.

On January 11th 2024, HUD published Notice CPD-23-103: Departmental Policy for addressing radon in the Environmental Review Process. This policy requires responsible entities to consider radon gas as a part of the Environmental Review Process. This policy goes into effect on April 11th, 2024. The Office of Community Development intends to follow all requirements for each program where applicable and subject to the new HUD policy.

Shannon updated the PAB on the previously mentioned MESO contract that was terminated. We proposed reallocating the funds to Ecumenical Ministries Organization who was partially funded in the 2023-2024 funding year. Staff was able to reach out and contacted them. These funds will go into the PAB contingency fund and will be available later to be used for infrastructure or facilities only, subject to approval from the PAB.

Staff proposed cancelling the March Policy Advisory Board Meeting; PAB members were in agreement. Immediately in advance of the April PAB meeting there will be a Public Hearing for the 2024 Action Plan.
