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## **VACCINE SAFETY & EFFECTIVENESS**

- Phase 1-3 clinical trials in humans
  - Volunteers representative of population
  - Placebo-controlled, double-blinded studies
  - Phase 4: post-manufacturing surveillance
  - Youth phase going now for 12+
- Oversight Groups
  - National to state/regional level



## VACCINE CHALLENGES

- Temperature control different needs for each
- 2 doses different intervals with different vaccines
- Messaging the common side effects and contraindications (EpiPen)
  - sore injection site, headache, achy muscle, low grade fever, fatigue



# FEDERAL & STATE PLAN

#### Phase 1A

#### Everyone in Phase 1, Groups 1,2,3 and 4 are currently eligible for the vaccine.

#### **Group 1**

- Hospitals
- Urgent Care
- Skilled nursing and memory care facility healthcare personnel (HCP) and residents
- Tribal health programs
- Emergency medical services (EMS) providers and other first responders
- Health care interpreters
- · Traditional health workers

#### Group 2

- Other long-term care facilities, including HCP and residents of:
- Residential care facilities
- Adult foster care
- Group homes for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities
- Other congregate care sites

- Hospice programs
- Mobile crisis care and related services
- Individuals working in a correctional setting

#### Group 3

- HCPs in outpatient settings serving specific high-risk groups
- · Day treatment services
- Non-emergency medical transport (NEMT)
- Caregivers of medically fragile children or adults who live at home

#### Group 4

- All other outpatient HCPs
- Public health sites

#### Phase 1B, 1C and Phase 2

#### Who's getting vaccinated in Oregon next

Child-care, preschool and K-12 school and school district staff will be in the first group of Phase 1B.

Subsequent groups in Phase 1B and beyond will be determined by the Vaccine Advisory Committee and shared on OHA's COVID-19 vaccine web page. These are examples of groups of people who may included:


- Critical workers in high-risk settings — workers who are in industries essential to the functioning of society and substantially higher risk of exposure
- People of all ages with underlying conditions that put them at moderately higher risk
- People in prisons, jails, detention centers, and similar facilities, and staff who work in such settings
- All older adults not included in Group 1A
- General population

# Twenty-seven member work group

- Advise OHA on vaccine sequencing for phases 1b, 1c and 2
- Represent communities unjustly impacted by Covid-19
- Focus on ethical principles to guide sequencing
- First meeting 1/7/2021
- Expect report in February


<sup>\*</sup>ACIP is a federal advisory committee made of up of medical and public health experts who develop recommendations on the use of vaccines in the U.S. public, including recommendations on what groups should be prioritized for COVID-19 vaccination first. The graphic below does not represent the progression of those priorities but is meant to describe which partners would provide vaccination services to different groups of people when they are eligible to receive vaccine.

# FEDERAL PHARMACY PARTNERSHIP & STATE FOCUS

- FPP currently serving many long-term care and congregate care facilities within 1a groups
- State expanding support for congregate care facilities not previously eligible/did not register
  - Foster homes, adults with disabilities, group care homes
- State committed to getting increased vaccine allocation to the metro region for increased phase 1A vaccination

# WASHINGTON COUNTY'S VACCINATION CLINIC FOCUS

- Vaccine distribution outside normal channels
  - Primary focus on BIPOC communities
  - Those without access to healthcare, pharmacies, or other vaccinedelivery systems
  - Those living in poverty
- Evenings and weekends



### WASHINGTON COUNTY'S ROLE

- Coordination with state, regional and local partners
  - Federally-qualified health centers and other Communitybased organizations
    - Engaging for best outreach to priority populations
  - City and County
    - Dispensing locations geographically spread for access
  - Health Systems
    - Large drive-thru vaccination operations
  - CBOs
    - Sponsors for specific populations/events
- Public communication and education
- Coordination of distribution across the many provider groups in support of phased approach



## PHASE 1A PRIORITIZATION

- All groups now eligible
- Planning and access in the metro region to open up but still follow prioritization due to limited vaccine
- Group 1: hospitals; urgent care settings; skilled nursing and memory care facility HCP and residents; tribal health programs; EMS providers and other first responders, among others.
- Group 2: other LTCFs and congregate care sites including residential behavioral health programs; hospice programs; mobile crisis care and related services; and secure transportation.
- Group 3: Outpatient settings serving specific high-risk groups; home health providers, day treatment services; and nonemergency medical transportation.
- Group 4: All other outpatient; public health and early learning sites; last responders.

## PHASE 1B PRIORITIZATION

- Top: K-12 school and school district staff, child-care, and preschool
- OHA 'Vaccine Advisory Committee' to create prioritizations based on equity
- Higher risk (age, likelihood to get Covid, etc.)
- Critical Infrastructure still broadly defined


# PHASE 1A/1B PLANNING (PUBLIC HEALTH)

- Working with EMS agencies to ensure they have access to vaccines and the ability to get them into arms
  - ALERT IIS reporting, Covid-19 Enrollment (giving vaccine and/or redistributing)
- Working with Health Systems and partners to ensure vaccine access for all in Phase 1A
- Reaching out to Cities and Districts to start conversations
  - Critical infrastructure and essential staff
  - Partnership for targeted public clinics

## ROLL OUT CHALLENGES

- Hospitals receiving first vaccine didn't have guidance mechanisms for bringing in other phase 1a groups
- Need/desire to get vaccine out as quickly as possible
- Federal pharmacy partnership program challenges
- Metro region needs more vaccination access through health care partners
- Many people are anxious to be in line/next
