#### **IV. BUSINESS ITEMS**

# A. Severe Weather Shelter (SWS) Data Analysis Findings – Professor Don Schweitzer, MSW, BSW, Pacific University

Pacific University Professor Don Schweitzer analyzed the Severe Weather Shelter (SWS) HMIS data from the 2018/19 winter shelter season and presented his findings to the workgroup. Professor Schweitzer prefaced his results with a note of caution due to the limitations of the HMIS software, missing data, data errors, and extensive manipulation by hand of the data.

Policy makers need to be made aware that even if SWS do everything perfect there are not enough resources on the other end. Annette spoke on system capacity reporting 495 PSH and 230 RRH beds are full. Shelter Plus Care beds have a low annual turnover rate of 20 per year but could increase if agencies demonstrate services are no longer needed for a client. The County offers a move-on option to transfer persons to Housing Choice Voucher (Section 8) program when rent subsidy becomes available.

Does the data support the idea that persons are coming here from Multnomah County? Don reported the data reflects the number of guests remain steady throughout season. Kim reported the SOS-Shelter saw a slight uptick in February when the Multnomah County shelters closed. Katherine stated that persons will go wherever beds are available. Kim's experience with the homeless population is they consider areas to be their home and will stay there regardless of bed availability. Marcia explained that Sequoia takes persons to Multnomah County all year long for services not provided in Washington County.

Sarala asked if the data included LGBTQ or transgender population. Don stated there were a few transgender persons in the data. Katherine explained the HMIS gender question is referring to gender identity and not sexual orientation and the response options cover all genders.

Question was asked if the data gave us a "good handle" on who is out there with dual diagnosis of mental illness and drug/alcohol addiction and whether the SWS were accessible to these persons. Brian explained that the shelters are accessible to everyone, however, they are not equipped to provide medical care or storage of medications. Katherine explained that the number one priority is housing and dual diagnosis piece is for agencies to address after someone is accepted into a program.

Kristy pointed out the data quality is already better than what was given to Don because of deduplication and data cleaning. He feels the data is good for benchmarks and for policy making and data will become more useful for trends overtime.

# Discussion on funding allocation to sustain/expand winter shelter operations scheduled to open 11/2/2019 and close on 3/29/2020. Discussion on process to achieve exits to permanent housing outcomes through alignment with the CoC system.

If the State were to issue funds for SWS, those funds would be used to sustain the current 8 sites ensuring they are able to provide basic needs of shelter and food. State funds for SWS would not be used for rental assistance. Any public funds would require shelters to do HMIS and require an intentional effort at the shelters to engage with persons regarding their housing needs and resources.

Aligning with the SWS this year is a Housing Navigator aimed at providing direct client services that would guide persons through system by interacting with them and acting as a bridge from outside to inside.

Community Action Organization will dedicate \$60,000 in EHA funds to be allocated to the shelters based on bed stays from last year. Contracts will be managed by CAO and will be sent to shelters. If OHCS awards the \$150,000 to our community, \$60,000 would be pulled from that to fund rapid rehousing rent assistance.

OHCS has put aside approximately \$1.5 million dollars to be allocated to 10 communities throughout Oregon to build up and expand shelter capacity. Instead of a competitive application process, communities need to fill out a survey demonstrating community collaboration and willingness to leverage these funds with existing funds and resources in the community. OHCS is asking for one recipient per community to act as the fiscal agent. Annette will be responding to the OHCS survey as the lead for SWS. If awarded, these funds would be distributed to the SWS based on bed stays from last season.

<u>Action</u>: Approve CAO to administer funds to go out to the 8 Severe Weather Shelters based on a proration value and hold \$60,000 back for rent assistance.

# B. 2020 U.S. Census Service-based Enumeration Team scheduled 3/30/2020, 3/31/2020, and 4/1/2020

U.S. Census Service-based enumeration team will be in Washington County collecting 2020 Census data on March 30, 31 and April 1, 2020. To collect homeless population data, the team will be put in contact with the Severe Weather Shelters and Outreach workers. More information to follow at future meetings.

#### C. Project Reset and Court Ordered Fees and Fines – Attorney Ellen Johnson

Project Reset is a program currently operating in Multnomah, Clark, and Columbia Counties for persons to work off court fines and fees through community service. These fees cannot be tied to victim assistance. Metropolitan Public Defenders Office is working with Project Reset on a proposal to bring the program to Washington County. The proposal will include a couple options for hourly rates and caps for community service hours. The topic will be brought to the Public Safety Coordinating Council meeting in November. Once the proposal is brought to the District Attorney's office, the County will need to agree to participate in order to be included in the request for funding that Project Reset will conduct after the first of the year. Community Connect data shows 406 persons in our system with approximately \$1.4 million dollars in court fees and fines. Of those, 132 persons also experienced domestic violence. It is common for DV survivors to incur court fees while leaving their abuser.

Fletcher Nash shared the story of a client that participated in the Project Reset program and was able to work off \$55,000 in court fees through community service and treatment hours. Once the fees were paid, he was able to get housing, a car, and a stable good paying job.

Annette reported although Project Reset is not available in Washington County, persons with court fees/fines in Multhomah, Clark, or Columbia counties can participate in the program. Annette will load a 10.10 to the cloud for Community Connect Assessors to use for referrals
