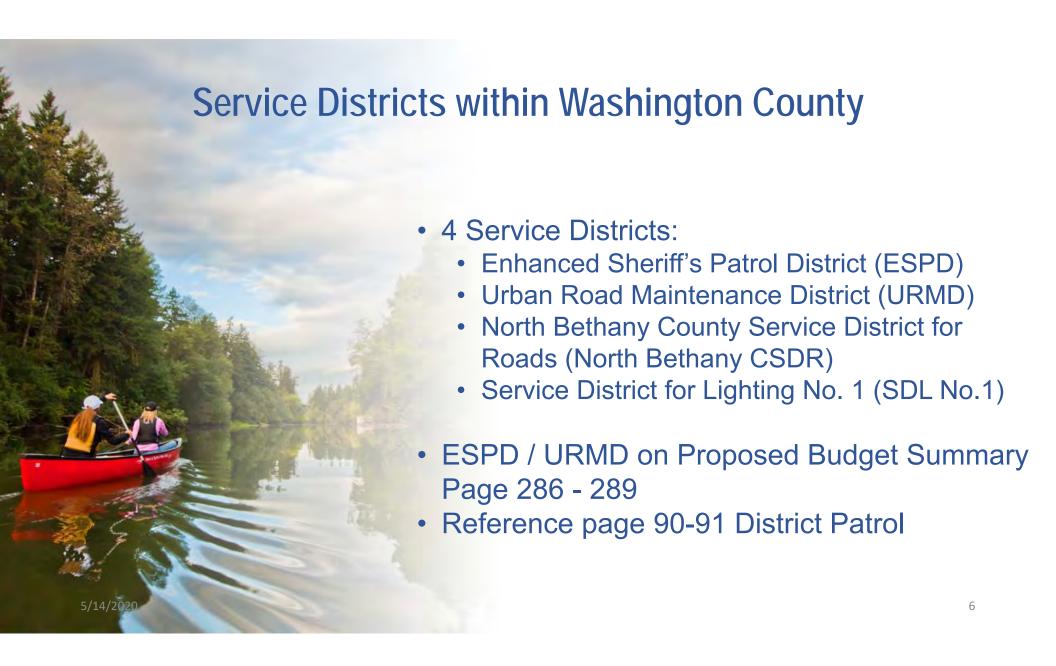

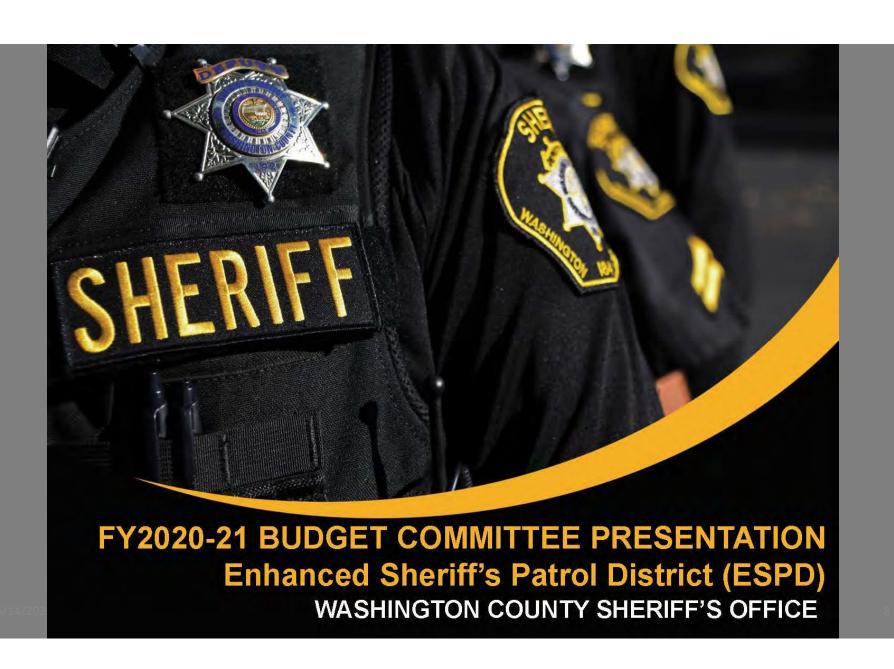

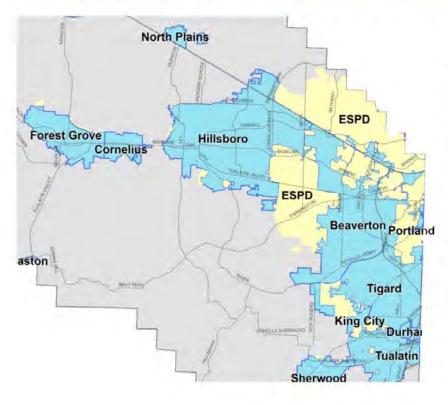


### **ENHANCED SHERIFF'S PATROL DISTRICT**

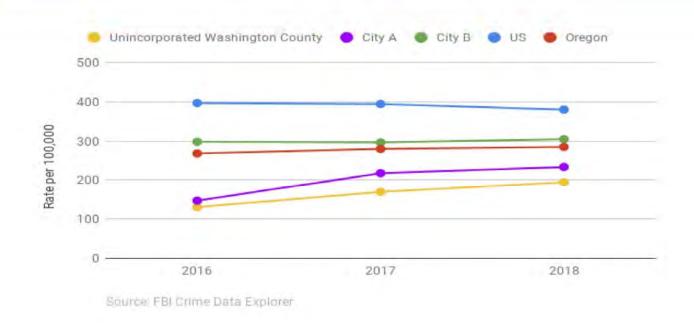

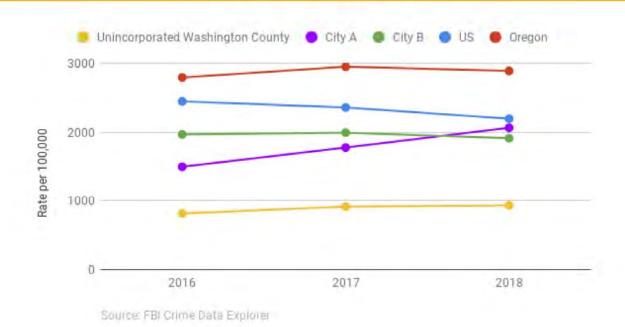


# National Incident Based Report System Person Crime Rate



Person Crimes: Assault, Homicide, Human Trafficking, Kidnapping/Abduction, Sex Offenses

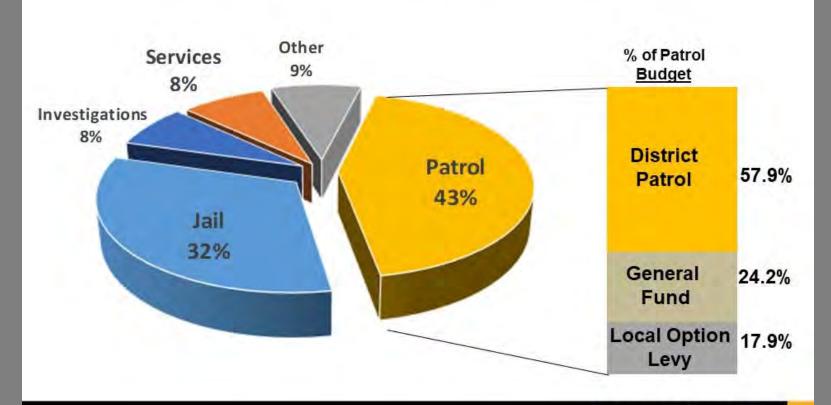
# National Incident Based Report System Property Crime Rate

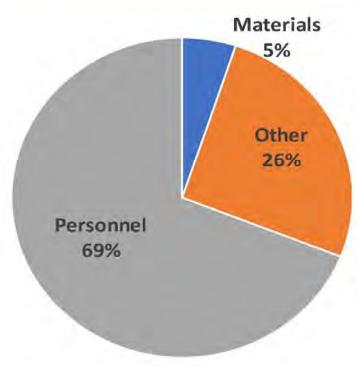

- Worked with Oregon Senior Peer Outreach support program and received GrandPad

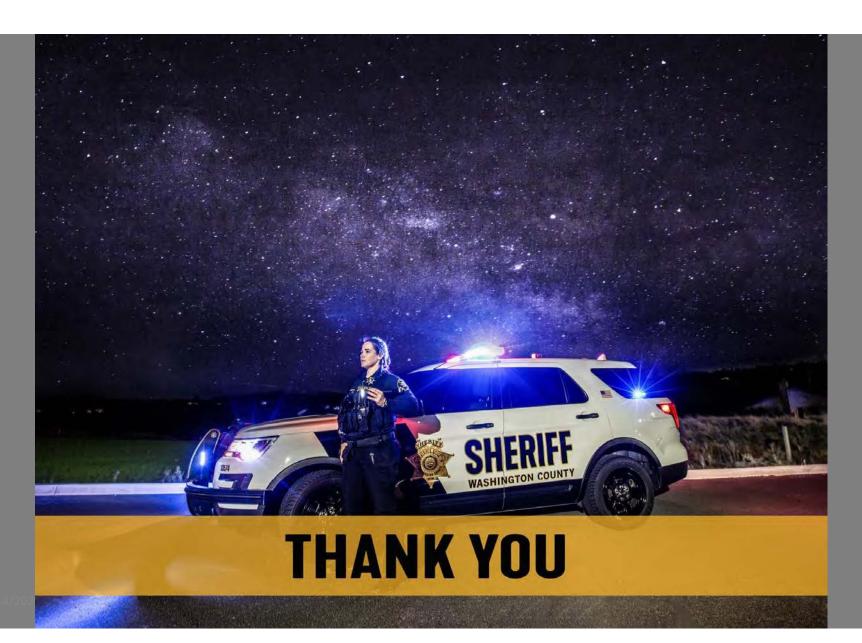




# Shop With a Cop

### Neighborhood Streets Program



#### Goals:

- Discourage undesirable driver behavior
- Improve multi-modal safety (peds, bikes, cars)
- Involve area residents in solving local traffic issues

#### How the program works:

- 1st Year (Phase 1): Education & Enforcement
- 2nd Year (Phase 2): Physical Devices

Anticipated eligibility for some "residential" Collectors in 2020 (pending Board approval)

## Pedestrian and Biking Improvement Program



















- Targeted projects inside URMD's boundary
- Program began in 2011
- First projects funded in FY 2012-13
- Biennial project selection process (since 2017)



### Accomplishments



- To date, 60 projects funded
  - Over \$28.7 million URMD funding
  - About \$3.5 million in other funding
- Project status:
  - Completed: 39
  - In Design: 13
  - Construction to begin in 2020: 8
- First 6 years of projects completed at 94% of budget (\$13.2 million v. \$14.1 million)
- Improved safety and connectivity



### Selection process



- Public (or staff) submits proposals
- Staff reviews proposals and presents URMDAC with candidates
- URMDAC reviews candidates and recommends projects to BCC



### 2019 selections



### 13 projects selected for FY 20-21 and FY 21-22

- 10 sidewalks, 1 sidewalk/asphalt path, 2 pedestrian crossings
- Cost estimates: \$11.4 million
  - -\$7 million of URMD funding



### Current status of selected projects



- FY 20-21 & FY 21-22 projects are being designed
- Project Team
  - Project Management: County staff
  - Design: Eight by consultants / five by County
  - Construction: Private contractors
    - Will begin in 2021 and continue into 2022

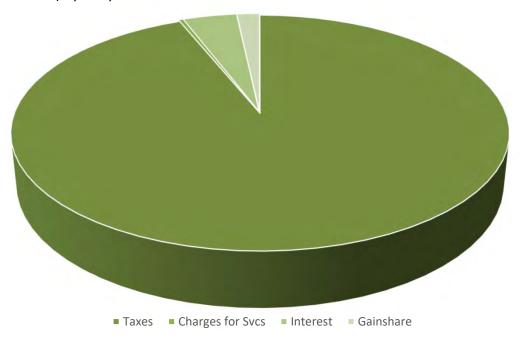

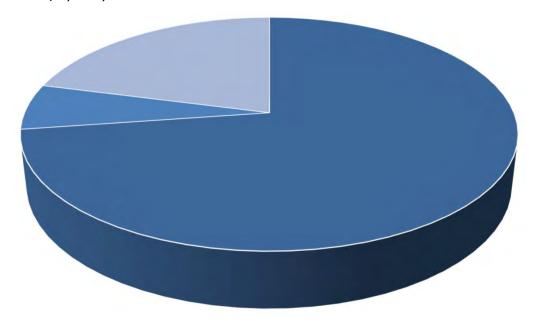
